Area need pushes expansions, drives agency programming

Most businesses actively search for ways to grow and expand their reach. Growth means more sales, which means profit increases. For social service agencies, growth isn't always a good thing as it typically indicates an increase in need, or more individuals who cannot meet their own needs.

In the past year, the agency has seen a marked increase in need across all programming. The Help Me Hotline saw a 13 percent increase in calls during 2022; Adopt-A-Family had an increase of more than 100 families. Soles for Christ saw its largest increase since COVID shuttered the school shoe program, with participation increasing by 217 children for 2022. Seasonal Services provided more fans and space heaters than any time in the program's history, with 237 households served in 2022.

The Diaper Depot and Lions Club Eveglasses had so many unfilled requests in 2022, the agency is taking steps to extensively expand both programs. Through the Lions Club partnership, the program will continue to serve uninsured clients, and will add services for children; it will also serve those who are between Medicare/ Medicaid prescription renewals. The Diaper Depot expansion will move from an emergency supply program to a supplemental program, providing participating households with up to two-thirds of a child's diapers per month for up to three years.

Unfortunately, expansions for social services carry the same price tag as any business, but do not hold the same profit-potential – unless those profits are measured in community health and welfare. Gratefully, our agency programs can 'profit' from community and donor support, and we are hopeful we can once again rely on our generous supporters to invest in these program expansions.

❖ The four most common funding needs of 2022 were: gasoline/ automotive/transporation, electric bills, sewer bills and gas bills.

There are no boundaries, no eligibility guidelines and no fees for this service.

The agency uses emergency funds for the people that "fall through the cracks" like car payments, insurance, and repairs, phone bills, medical needs and other necessities required to exist. The agency tries to fill those gaps.

A-Family

The majority, 79 percent (647 families), are at 100 percent or below poverty guidelines; 18 percent (144 families) are up to 35 percent above poverty guidelines; and 3 percent (25 families) are 36 percent or more above poverty guidelines.

❖ In 2022, 723 different adopters provided assistance to the families. This included, 252 individuals, families, businesses, and organizations. There were 471 undesignated monetary donations made to the program to help cover the cost of food baskets, gift cards and vouchers for families.
